## Letter from the Executive Director

#### FRIENDS AND SUPPORTERS OF THE WVCBP,

The past year reinforced our resolve while making clear the immense work that lies ahead to achieve our mission of an equitable and prosperous West Virginia for all. In 2024, we strengthened existing

coalitions and launched new collaborative efforts, as we've learned we can only progress by working together and maintaining a clear, bold proactive vision.

We continued to prioritize co-created research and policy solutions including publishing a report on the high costs to children and families of the juvenile justice system, co-authored with the Midian Leadership Project, and an interactive piece highlighting how the Medicaid program could be more accessible as told through the voices of those on Medicaid, both of which will be highlighted in more depth in this report.

We became the state's KIDS COUNT® partner, allowing us to focus more capacity on gathering credible data and policy recommendations regarding child care, child welfare, and K-12 education, all of which are policy decisions we must get right as a state for the future of our children. Our team helped create our first ever proactive policy agenda for children endorsed by more than 20 organizations as part of the Legislative Action Team for Children and Families, a hopeful and proactive roadmap for policymakers and communities.

2024 was also a year of accountability, where **we highlighted the impacts and opportunity costs of harmful policy decisions made in our state**. The cost of
2023's deep tax cuts became clear in the inability of policymakers to advance a single bill to
improve child care access and affordability, despite commitments that it was a top priority. It was
also clear in the failure to advance efforts to increase funding for public schools, invest in flood
mitigation, and make improvements to infant and maternal health.

With additional tax cuts hitting in 2025, our accountability efforts to educate policymakers and the public about the importance of well-resourced public institutions and supports for workers and families will continue.

Our staff and board are endlessly grateful for our organizational and community partners, funders and donors, and supporters who are aligned in our journey to achieve an equitable and prosperous future for all West Virginians.

A prosperous West Virginia where everyone has a meaningful opportunity to thrive with equitable access to health care, education, jobs, housing, and safe communities.




## Together for Public Schools WV Coalition Launch

Together, we are building community among parents and school staff, between businesses and schools, and across school districts through conversations, town halls, and listening sessions. Our solidarity will help build a community-rooted plan to ensure all schools have the resources they need to serve their students and families.



## Becoming an Official KIDS COUNT® Partner


In 2024, the WVCBP became West Virginia's member of KIDS COUNT®. KIDS COUNT is a national network coordinated by the Annie E. Casey Foundation that provides lawmakers, public

officials, the media, and community members with reliable data, policy recommendations, and tools to advance policies that benefit children. As the West Virginia partner, our team helps compile data and analysis and craft policy solutions to improve the lives of all children in our state.

As part of this project, we released our first KIDS COUNT Data Book with county-level data measuring the well-being of children in all 55 counties.

#### STATE OF WORKING WEST VIRGINIA 2024: WOMEN'S PAID AND UNPAID LABOR



The I7th edition of the State of Working West Virginia, an annual report that examines the state's economy through the lens of its workers, focused on the state of women in and around West Virginia's workforce. The report found that while the outlook for women in

West Virginia's workforce has improved over the years, with declining unemployment and rising labor force participation, many disparities still exist. The gap between men and women persists in labor force participation, wages, poverty, and overall economic insecurity. The report also found that women bear a disproportionate share of caregiving responsibilities, essentially unpaid labor that is vital to the economy. Of the women who are not participating in the formal labor force, over half are caring for home and family. This unpaid work is worth just under \$1.6 billion in West Virginia.

### "IT'S NOT DESIGNED FOR CHILDREN": A FULLER ACCOUNTING OF THE COSTS OF WEST VIRGINIA'S CRIMINAL SYSTEM FOR YOUTH



The WVCBP partnered with Midian Leadership Project (Charleston), a Black-led youth leadership organization, to learn more about the criminal legal system for children. Our research began with a look at the financial penalties imposed by courts: fines, fees, and

restitution. But as we reviewed the data and spoke with those personally impacted by the criminal legal system, we learned that the most serious costs are those that go uncounted.

The report revealed a system that separates children from their loved ones, classrooms, and community supports, while extracting wealth from their families in the form of financial penalties, jail expenses, rides to and from court appointments, lost work earnings, and more. But the most striking finding was how a criminal case record and resulting trauma followed people into adulthood.

The report calls on West Virginia to reduce the ever-expanding criminal system for children, to invest instead in child-affirming institutions such as public schools and community recreation centers, and to support parents and caregivers with a living wage, affordable housing, and access to health care.

#### Medicaid in the Mountain State

In 2024, the WVCBP continued our work to learn from Medicaid enrollees how the program could be more efficient and accessible for themselves and their families. In partnership with West Virginians for Affordable Health Care, we collected video and audio clips from storytellers,

allowing them to directly share their experiences with the public, lawmakers, and other decision makers in their own words. These conversations highlighted the life-saving impacts of Medicaid through increasing access to substance use treatment, cancer care, and preventive services. They also showed the ways in which underinvestment in Medicaid program administration has made health care more difficult to access when eligible people are denied due to paperwork barriers and when connecting with a person on the phone or in the office takes many hours. These insights helped support meaningful changes to make the state's Medicaid program more accessible including streamlining enrollment and renewals and advancing policies that allow stronger communication with enrollees.



## Community Collaborative Council



In 2024, the WVCBP launched the Community Collaborative Council (CCC),

a project to support people behind bars and the many folks who care about them. In dozens of conversations with people who are incarcerated, the WVCBP learned what resources are most needed. The result is the CCC website, where people can access self-help materials about West Virginia's jail and prison system, learn how to advocate for parole release, and connect to other advocates through the WV Criminal Law Reform coalition.
